This is the first formal opportunity for me to wish you and your family a 'Happy New Year' - I hope 2023 is a great year for you.

We have got off to a flying start at Lansdowne Primary Academy, so thank you for your support with this pupils are safe, happy and ready to make good progress with their learning!

We are moving ever closer to national assessments which take place to monitor the learning, progress and attainment of children at Lansdowne Primary Academy compared to national expectations. It is important that pupils meet these milestones to be ready for the next stage of their education, whether this be the next year group or secondary school. Key dates include:

- Key Stage 2 [Year 6] National assessments: Tuesday 9 May Friday 12 May 2023
- Key stage 1 [Year 2[National assessments: Week beginning: May 2023 [dates to be advised]
- Year 1 and 2 [for pupils not passing in Year 1] phonics screening check: Monday 6 June 2023
- Year 4 Multiplication Check: Monday 6 June 2023

In order to work with the school to ensure your child/children make good progress, please ensure the following:

- Read to your child every night and have them read to you develop a love for reading in your family
- Pupils attend school every day, on time It's not OKAY to be away!
- Support your child by attending workshops and family learning sessions
- Pupils attend additional learning periods before or after school, as invited
- Make your child's learning and progress a priority have high aspirations of what they can achieve with the right support and challenge adopt a no excuses culture

Did you know that by the end of Year 4, pupils need to know their timestables up to 12 x 12 fluently? Please ensure your child uses Numbots or TT-rockstars for at least 10 minutes per night to ensure they achieve this national expectation. 

ANTI-BULLYING PROCESS



Step 1- Speak up and STAND UP

Step 2 - INVESTIGATE

'At Lansdowne - bullying is not OK! Bullying bothers me'

The adults in school will listen to me-

They will speak to everyone involved to find out what happened.

I may have to write down what has been happening.

The adult may keep a secret eye on me - they are helping me to stay safe.

Step 3 - FIX IT

'We are a team at Lansdowne and we STAND UP to bullies!'

The adults will talk to the person who is being bullied and the person who is the bully.

The adults will try and understand why something has happened, how everyone feels and what needs to change.

The adults will continue to monitor the situation and support the victim to feel empowered as well as supporting the bully so that their behaviour changes.

The adults will try to help mend any broken relationships if this is wanted.

The adults will check in regularly to make sure that we are safe and happy.

If I STAND UP against bullying - the adults in school will support me-

Consequences of Bullying

If I am bullying another child, this means I am making our school unsafe and unhappy. I will not be allowed on the playground for an amount of time and there could be more serious consequences.

We have been very impressed with the children who have shown a very sharp start this half-term during their PE lessons. The children have returned back to school ready to learn, showing great enthusiasm and the eagerness to develop/progress.

This term in PE we are continuing to look at a variety of skills to help broaden our children's knowledge as well as strengthening and developing their physical skills.

Year 6 have started the term working and mastering their accuracy and precision skills using archery. This term, Reception are developing their coordination skills with a strong focus on their footwork. Year 5 are looking at mastering their static balance using benchball and yoga.

Early Years

Nursery

The nursery children have made an excellent start to Spring 1 and our topic focus of 'Transport'. This week we have enjoyed exploring this in our group times and our play! The children have spent time constructing modes of transport and even worked together to make a rainbow bus using an empty cardboard box! The frosty and icy weather brought lots of opportunities to explore the changes outside, write our name in the frost and discuss what happens to the ice as it melts!







In Reception this week we had a fun learning experience wit KIT theatre. We had the pleasure of meeting Professor Memo, had the opportunity to dig for fossils, danced and learned a dinosaur song and participated in lots of other fun activities!





ACORNS

In Acorns, we have had a great start to the new year. The children have enjoyed spending time visiting our tube station and tube train in the outdoor role play area as part of the Eye on London topic. They have also completed lots of activities linked to our Science topic of animals, including making bottle penguins and using the messy play farmyard. We have also been trying out some new equipment, such as our 'Whizzy Dizzy', which helps develop gross motor skills and coordination.











Year 1 have been really busy this half term learning lots of exciting knowledge about their new topics. In geography, the children are learning all about London, they had a great time going on a virtual bus tour of London and seeing all of the famous landmarks. They have been learning what human and physical features are and using this knowledge to identify human and physical features of London.

To start their new science topic, all about animals, the children came dressed up as an animal. It was amazing to see their fantastic costumes! They have been learning about different ways that animals can be grouped. They have been thinking like scientists.

In computing, the children have been learning how to give instructions to a beebot so that it will do exactly what they want it to do...it's been a bit tricky but great fun!









Year 2 have been very excited to start their new topics for the half term. In history, the children are learning all about the Great Fire of London. They enjoyed taking part in a Now Press Play experience where they learnt historical facts about the Great Fire and how it all started with the baker in Pudding lane. In Religious Education, the children are learning about Christianity and what it means to be a Christian.

In their English lessons this week the children received an interesting package that contained a diary written about the Great Fire of London. They have been given a mission to go back in time and let the baker know that London was rebuilt after the fire. This is going to be an exciting mission that will really help the children with their writing.



In science, Year 4 have started the unit 'sound' and this week have been learning about the different parts of the ear.










Year 5 have had a great start to the new term, they are taking responsibility for their learning, turning up to ALPS, reading every night and completing TTRS.


We have started our new topic in history which is World War I. The children have enjoyed learning the chronology of the key events of WW1 and the reasons behind why the war began. They have been learning about propaganda and the role of women in WW1.





The children have been enjoying their new science topic, materials. Every lesson this half term involves an experiment, the children are enjoying experimenting with different materials identifying their properties and changes in state.







Year 6 have made a very sharp start this half-term. We have been impressed with the children who have attended ALPS and taken responsibility for their learning. We have started our geography unit by trying to build a famous London landmark from paper and sellotape - we are really looking forward to seeing some for real on the 26th January. In science, the children have been learning about different classifications of living things, including mould- this piece of bread had been rubbed on a door handle - it made us all want to wash our hands!!
